




- The simple answer is NOT IN FULFORD MAIN STREET today but once upon a time, all these products could have been purchased in Main Street.
- The earliest known shop in Fulford Main Street is listed on the 1841 Census as Thomas Dickinson's, shoemaker of 101 Main Street, followed on by Ann Shaw, a niece of the Dickson family.
- Robert Medd on the 1861 Census is shown as a cow keeper and shop keeper in the area close to Medd's Lane.
- 1868 Leng's Biscuit Bakers opened at 77 Main Street.
- The first Post Office opened in the village at 18 Main Street around the late 1880's although the premises in the 1860's, 70's and 80's had been a Bookmakers, Grocers and Shoemaker's Shop. Various members of the Hall family had been responsible for the various businesses.
- Harrison's Taxis were well established in the late 1800's having moved from Naburn Lane into Main Street by the 1891 Census.
- 1905 saw the start of the Duffield empire with Harry Duffield's cycle shop at his home at 24 Main Street.
- Britton's Dairy began in 1920.
- The purpose-built row of shops at the end of Prospect Terrace was built in 1904 and shopping in Main Street began to flourish.
- Other household trades and industries, listed in the earlier 1800's Census's, which potentially could have been classed as "shops" included:
- Building trades, joiners, glazier, blacksmiths, saddlers and cordwainers (shoemakers belonging to a Guild), butcher, market gardeners and nursery men, tailors, knitters, dressmakers and collar makers, laundry workers and char women.
- Small shops were established in the 18th and 19th century in many remote places where transport was limited and a single shop was sufficient to service the needs of the community.
- 1970's saw the death of the village Grocery Shop. Village shops today tend to be used by firms offering specialised goods and services, rather than food shopping.
- The first full-scale supermarket in Britain was opened by the London Co-Operative Society, in Manor Park, on January 12 1948. Sainsbury's in 1950 and Tesco in 1954.
- I think that many of our older residents, in Fulford, miss The Premier Store (our last small convenience store in Main Street), but for those more able to get around we do have a Co-op, Aldi, Iceland and Sainsbury's in the area.

Buried in the Old St. Oswald's Church yard appears on the 1851 Census as a servant to Thomas Dixon and an apprentice shoemaker.



A shoemakers and grocer's in the 19th Century to a Newsagents in the 20th Century.

Newsagents

Local store selling and delivering national and local morning and evening newspapers. A range of magazines could be purchased from here. They also had a good stock of sweets and cigarettes.

Ernest and May Goulding Proprietors, Jimmy W. Goulding newsagent. Ernest Goulding local councillor. Arthur Garwell (9 Prospect Terrace circa 1950's) could regularly be seen on his bicycle delivering papers.

After the Goulding's left the business then others ran it as a newsagent (see next slide) for a while before it became a chemist.

Paperboy (and less commonly Papergirl) was an iconic role of youngsters, often their first job, in Western nations during the heyday of printed newspapers. A paperboy's task was to distribute printed newspapers to homes or offices of subscribers on a regular route, usually on foot or by bicycle. This has often been a before-school or after-school job for adolescents.

Under UK law, a child should not work for more than one hour before school and not start before 7am. During the school holidays, those aged 13-14 should not work for more than 25 hours a week, while 15-16 year olds should not do more than 35 hours.

Moving on to the next oldest establishment.

Robert Medd (1786 – 1879) was born in Swainby and married Jane Raby also from Swainby. They were married at St. Oswald's, Fulford in February 1825. This was the beginning of nearly 100 years of the Medd family living at 32 Main Street, in Fulford and even having a lane named after them.

Robert initially a male servant, went to become a freehold house owner and therefore able to vote, and later the parish clerk. In 1851 he is listed as cow keeper and by 1861 a shop keeper.

Robert and Jane had 8 children all born in Fulford. Their oldest boy, Joseph (unmarried) remain at 32 Main Street all his life and became one of the village saddlers. Robert and Jane's third child Jane married Thomas Duffield (joiner).

The garden advert taken from St. Oswald's Parish magazine 1909 refers to Robert's grandchild Robert whose parents were Charles and Sarah.

Jane died in 1878 aged 80.


Robert died in 1879 aged 90.

Joseph died 1905 aged 79.



1868 Leng's Biscuit Bakers opened at 77 Main Street and they are the makers of Fulford Biscuits – rather like a water biscuit.

Lengs – Makers of Fulford Biscuits

This biscuit was plain, yeast-raised, and saucer-sized, a development from the much plainer (and harder) ship's biscuit. It used the dying heat of the bread oven and was probably made by the women of the family because it did not need the physical strength of bread making, so in all likelihood, "invented" by Hannah.

In the early 1800's, in time for the youngest boy to be christened, John sold out to William and moved to Fulford in search of a better education for the boys and better marriage prospects for his girls. At this time there were many unemployed and often disabled soldiers from the Napoleonic Wars in the countryside, but probably, he was also looking for a wider market for the biscuit, now named the 'Fulford Biscuit'.

Non-Freeman of the City were not allowed to open a shop in York, but could trade in Thursday market, where William sold his meat and where kin lived at 7 St. Sampson's Square.

Prior to selling fish and chips, Thornton's opened a hardware store in the premises selling a range of household goods.

Today 77 Main Street is a Fish and Chip Shop.

For many years this has been a fish and chip shop. Mr and Mrs Didlot's fish and chip shop, close to the Dairy, had burn down but the re-opening of a fish and chip shop, on the other side of the road, was a real boon to the residents of the village. First established by the Thornton family who lived at 77 Main Street. Miller's Fish Bar, sold in October 2011 for £135,000, was an award winner, but the shop has always been popular with both villagers and passing trade. The present owners were retiring after 34 years in the trade.

We now move on to the first of three Post Offices which were located in Main Street

1840 The first adhesive postage stamp, the Penny Black, was released nationally, and the Uniform Penny Post, by which letters could be sent for one penny, was established.

1852 The first Post Office pillar box was erected in Jersey.

1853 The first post boxes were erected in mainland Britain.

1880 Postmen began to use bicycles to deliver the mail.

The first Post Office opened in the village at 18 Main Street around the late 1880's although the premises in the 1860's, 70's and 80's had been a Bookmakers, Grocers and Shoemaker's Shop. Various members of the Hall family had been responsible for the various businesses.

The Hall family occupied this property between 1861 and 1901 Census.

1861 William is a bookmaker and grocer

1871 and 1881 William's trade is a shoemaker

1881 Census lists the property as a Post Office but William's occupation is shown as a shoemaker.

Post Office – Miss Annie Hall, sub-postmistress. London and other letters are received through York by mail cart.

1891 William is a the Sub Postmaster

1901 William's daughter Annie has taken over as Post Mistress

1911 Annie remains the Post Mistress and is supported by her sister Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Teale

The post office was first based at 18 Main Street (1911, 1901,1891 and 1881 Census). It then moved to 50 Main Street and finally to 94/96 Main Street before closing in 2008


Bulmer's Directory of 1892 Post, Money Order Office, and Savings Bank at Gate Fulford; William Hall, postmaster. Letters, via York, arrive at 5-35 a.m. and 4-0 p.m., and are despatched at 10-30 a.m. and 7-45 p.m.

By the mid-1860s York had two postal deliveries a day; a letter posted in London before noon was delivered in York the same evening. York's main post office in Lendal was built in 1884.





Mrs G G F Berry, sub-postmistress of Fulford, York, who has three watercolours in the 37th annual exhibition of the Post Office Art Club of Great Britain. One is a portrait study, another a picture of Patrick Pool, Old York and the third is of Scarborough Harbour. The exhibition is being held in London this week.

Michael and Judy Thorpe Post Master and assistant ran the village post office for many years. In later years Mrs Thorpe also had a corner selling a range of small antiques. Michael and Judy suffered a robbery. The thief broke into their home in Heslington Lane, stole keys and broke into the post office.

1995 Terror gang tie up couple – Michael Appleton and his wife were attacked and tied up in their home at Palms Close, Naburn. The gang stole the keys for Fulford Post Office. They broke into the PO and stole an amount of cash.



Possible car make - a Lancia or possibly a Rolls Royce. He did have both in his time.

Business must have been good in those days!

'Zoom-in' close-up to Frank Harrison (Peter's grandfather) and his car; he is wearing his 'taxi cap'.

Peter never went into the taxi firm but first had a career in the path labs at York Hospital and then opened a series of businesses with this wife Val. - mainly fish and chips in the North East but also a general store and mobile shop serving outlying villages in the Shap area, a B and B in Shap and also a book shop in Kirby Stephen.


Joseph Aloysius Hansom was born in Micklegate. He was the son of a builder and became a freeman of York. After showing flair for design he became an architect's apprentice and moved to Halifax.

In 1828 Hansom registered his idea of the 'patent safety cab'. Safety features included a suspended axle, while the larger wheels and lower position of the cab led to less wear and tear and fewer accidents.

Although the Hansom cab became a ubiquitous part of the Victorian street scene - the 'black cab' of its day - he never made much money from it. Hansom sold the design for £10,000 to a company which then got into difficulties and couldn't pay him.

He resumed his architectural work, specialising in buildings for the Roman Catholic church.



Military Sunday April 30th 1905 was a splendid occasion. There was a military tournament in the Exhibition Building. The special Fantasia had been composed, dedicated to the officers and men of the West Yorkshire Duke of Wellington's Regiments. On the auspicious day in the village of Fulford, one mile from the century of the city Mr James (HARRY) Duffield was taking the first steps on what has become the oldest family firm of motor engineers in the area.

THE YORKSHIRE HERALD 30th April 1905

"An impressive service in the Minster with a notable Muster of Arms and a great gathering of people. The streets were crowded with thousands of people. The citizens were up betimes and gladly hailed the appearance of the sun. From villages, towns and cities which surround York, came hosts of happy wheelmen who in their expectation of a good time in the Minster City, plodded on regardless of the greasy roads."


But on that day in the village of Fulford, one mile from the centre of the city, Mr James "Harry" Duffield was taking the first steps into what has become the oldest family firm of motor engineers in the area. Not that motor engines were in evidence on that day. He began by repairing punctures on bicycles, left at his small cottage by people coming into York for the Military Parade.

JAMES HENRY DUFFIELD CYCLE AGENT - 69 MAIN STREET









Late 1920's - According to St. Oswald's Primary School admissions register. Terence Eugene Sparrow was admitted to the school. He was born 11.11.25 and was living at The Cycle Shop, Fulford. Could this be where he lived? The business moved to 69 Main Street – was this a sign of the times that an earlier occupant had been a saddler? The first petrol pump was installed in 1922 and only the second in York.

James Henry "Harry" could build a cycle from "scratch", never tiring of tinkering with them and bicycles continued to be sold until after his death in 1959. Mr. Paul Duffield, Harry's grandson, was President of the Velo Club York Cycle Racing Club.


While bicycles continued to be James Henry's first love he saw the coming of the motor age and welcomed it. After the First World War – he had spent the war years at Barlow, near Selby working on airships while his wife looked after the shop – he expanded to include the sale of motor cycles such as the New Hudson and Rudge-Whitworth.

In 1922 the first petrol pump was installed. Only the second in York and the last before Selby – some 13 miles. Before this petrol was sold in 2 gallon cans.

PHOTOGRAPHS

You can see the sign over the window and to the right of the premises is a petrol pump. (1922) The car to the far right of the picture is being filled. The photo on the next page clearly shows the petrol pump with the Shell sign over the top and Harry Duffield standing in the doorway of his shop. You can see the hose running from the car and back to the pump. Eventually legislation stated that any business trading in petrol needed an "entrance and exit" for the sale of petrol. The business needed to be on the move again (1950). This time the garage moved to its final location on the orchard land between 22 and 24 Main Street.

Duffields

Harry had a son Thomas and a daughter Ethel and in 1924 his son, Thomas, joined the firm, after serving an apprenticeship with Lambert Brothers of Swinegate. They began to sell motor cars and although Mr Tom Duffield, Chairman, couldn't remember the pioneering days of motoring, he can remember days when cars were not fitted with windscreen wipers or wind down windows.

Though cars were simpler then, they required much more repairing. The sort of specialised equipment we take for granted today was just not available – most cars came with whatever tools were needed to keep them on the road.

The Thirty's saw the world on wheels. Cars were not just for weekend spins, or enthusiasts or the rich but because of a growing urban population and industrialisation, a mass market was beginning to grow. At about this time Duffield's became agents for Standard Motor Cars.

The post war years brought new hope and plans for a bigger garage, showroom and workshops. In 1950 the present premises were built and Mr Paul Malcolm Duffield, Harry's grandson joined the family firm eventually becoming managing director.

The 50's were years of looking forward to better things – and eventually getting them.

Technical changes were rapidly made, mass unit construction, more sophisticated suspension for smaller cars, safer tyres and brakes all generated the need for specialised equipment. In the early 50's we became agents for Ford Motor Cars and continued with them for 25 years.

In the 60's the new showroom was built and enabled more models to be displayed in greater space and comfort.

In 1974, the garage lost, because of our location, the Ford Agency. After careful consideration of other British products, the decision was made to take a foreign franchise. The aim had always been to provide our customers with a sound reliable and exciting choice of vehicle and they felt that the Mitsubishi Colt was the most suitable.

On January 1st 1975 the first Colt cars were on the road in York. Billed as a Tough New Breed of Car, the challenge to promote and successfully sell an entirely new "name" was right for the 70's.

In 1972, 73 and 75 the garage won "Shell Shine" competitions and was voted one of the top 3 shell stations in the country.

The products of the 70's, be they be British or Foreign show an awareness of changing needs. Speed, safety measures and anti-pollution controls require increasingly sophisticated machinery and highly trained engineers to service them. Our workshops are equipped with Digital Electronic Machinery to deal with Health and Safety checks, Optical Wheel Alignment and Balancing and Equipment, Roller Break Tester, Reflex Head-lamp Beam Tester and much more. Including all equipment necessary to meet Department of Transport requirements as an MOT Testing Station.

16th November 1955 Mrs Sarah Duffield of Main Street Fulford aged 73 died. She had been an invalid for 22 years but died after a fall. A verdict of accidental death was announced. James Henry Duffield, a garage proprietor, reported the death.

Paul Malcolm Duffield, Thomas and Sarah's son eventually became managing director of Duffield's Garage.

They were winners of Shell Shine competitions in 1972,1973 and 1975.

The moved from Ford in 1975 to Mitsubishi Colt.

The garage prospered until the late 1990's when the site was sold to build Eliot Court in 1995 and Pavilion Row in 2006.

Paul died in January 2006 aged 73 years.

According to Alan Briggs Teasdale and Metcalfe built a shed, to the rear of this property to enable Tom Britton to repair dairy vehicle locally as well as his passion for repairing motorbikes..

1911 Richard Britton (as above) and family – Farmer and according to Kelly's 1921 and 1929 Richard Britton was now classed as a dairyman.

This same census shows Ernest Britton, Richard's son, aged 8 years. He went on to be a District Councillor and played an active part in local affairs.

Tom Britton, Ernest's younger brother, took over the running of this farm.

Members of the Britton family were already selling milk, in the neighbourhood in the latter part of the 19th Century.

Behind 100 Main Street was the dairy with a milk processing and bottling plant.


Ernest's way of promoting his business was to welcome new commers to the village with a couple of pints of free milk in the hope that they would make a regular order.

It is likely that Britton's owned all the land between the dairy and the laundry. A business that they bought in 1978 from the Gilderdales. My son remembers playing in the area at the rear of Main Street to the left of the dairy. Outbuildings containing old milk bottles, fork lift trucks and old cars. At the front of this land where St. Oswald's Court now stands was the dairy shop. A purpose built free standing shop later taken over by Richard Schumacher. He moved to his present location once the Bide-a-wee café, when his business was broken into and his current shop became vacant.










The purpose built row of shops was built in 1904 and shopping in Main Street began to flourish.

FULFORD READING ROOMS

The Village Reading Rooms had been built by Robert Fenwick in 1873 and was open from 8am to 10pm. It was let to the Parish at a nominal rent of 1/- per annum. It had a library of 700 volumes, two local daily papers, a London paper the Yorkshire Gazette. A committee was in charge and at one time Mr Wilson, the schoolmaster, was the secretary. Alas, according to the parish magazine in 1869 it had to be closed for a time because of the "unruly behaviour of several lads", though it seems to have been flourishing some time later. It was probably finally closed about the end of the 19th century, perhaps around the time York Library was opened.

FISH AND CHIPS

Originally Fulford Reading Rooms.

The fish and chip shop that burned down was to the LHS of the Heathholme drive. The owners were Mr Mrs Didlot – Late 1950's and early 1960's. According to Roger Martin, Bobby Reily was the fish and chip shop lad. The fish and chip shop was also owned by Dukes Fisheries of York

According to St. Oswald's Primary School entrance records held in the archives at the school a Leslie Dunford living at the FISH SALOON, FULFORD was admitted to the school in the 1930/40'





IVY COTTAGE AND THE LAUNDRY

Nichola Rollerson nee Gilderdale wrote giving the following details:-

William Edward Crossley purchased the York & Ainsty Laundry (which at that time was a very small hand laundry run by two ladies in Fulford) some time in the early 1900s. According to Irene Bridon's Book one of the ladies was Mrs Sarah Ibbotson, launderess from Clifton. – White's 1892. . In 1905 it was taken over by Mr Crossley

Around 1912 (two years after he married my grandmother - Ann Maria Beere) William Edward Crossley designed and built a larger laundry equipped with the latest machinery. The 1911 Census gives the following information - Green Cottage Fulford - William Edward Crossley (39) Laundry Manager and his wife Ann Marie Crossley (30).

In the early days the office for the laundry was in Ivy Cottage, but so far as I know the laundry itself was not.

In the 1960s the laundry and office were in a separate building altogether - a building that was demolished to make room for the flats which are now there.

1911 Laundry Cottage Fulford - George Crossley (65) Laundry Man and Fanny Crossley (69)

W E Crossley ran the laundry until his death in 1924.

1924 - 1952 At that point his wife, my grandmother (Ann Crossley) took over the running of the laundry and continued to do so for the next 28 years.

1952 Nichola Rollerson parents Owen and Nancy Gilderdale took over the laundry and ran it until around 1978

1978 Ernest Britton, three sons Richard, Douglas and Kenneth bought laundry from Gilderdale's. The laundry was sold to Britton's as the manager, Owen, who looked after it became ill and the work was too much.

It was sold in 1978, including Ivy Cottage. The meeting took place on site and the sale was subsequently agreed. Carol was ready to go.




A York property which has been owned by the same family for more than 60 years is being brought to the market by auction. The property, in Main Street, Fulford, was originally purchased in 1952 for £850.





Times have certainly changed since the early 1900's. Fulford has seen a range of outlets and even tried to embrace the 1950's trends of Supermarket Shopping with the Co-Op, the Happy Shopper and the Premier Stores.

In 2018 Internet shopping has led to the demise of many local shops. Today Pop-Up Shops are a trend and here in Fulford we have our very own "Scavengers" in 12 Main Street once the home of Dick Rollinson and his family.

A FORMER York bookseller who was also "one of the city's most influential Christians" has died, aged 94.

Hundreds gathered at St Michael le Belfrey Church to celebrate the life of Dick Rollinson, described as a "wise, common-sense and principled man of faith", by a longstanding friend and former business partner, Derek Reed.

"Thousands of lives have been touched through the life, humble example and ministry of this thoroughbred 'Yorkie', who was born and died in this city," he said. "He leaves a still growing legacy of lives changed for the better. The term 'the Rollinson Ripple Effect' was coined to describe this on-going phenomenon."

"He said Mr Rollinson started the Barbican Bookshop in 1947 via a suitcase to a Parliament Street market stall selling Christian books, cards and other material. It moved to Walmgate Bar in 1963 - hence the name - and finally in 1967 relocated to Fossgate, and branches appeared in other northern locations including Harrogate and Durham.

Mr Reed said the firm took over the long-established Pickering's Bookshop in Shambles in 1972 and at one point had four premises open in York in Fossgate, Walmgate, Shambles and Goodramgate.

"As well as books relating to the Christian religion, York and Yorkshire provided another happy hunting ground in the teeming stock. The shops were renowned for their local history range, both ancient and modern."


Mr Rollinson retired from the bookshop in 1982, after which it was run by Les Bingham until it finally closed in 2014.


Mr Reed said he "made God's presence felt" through the bookshop but also through the Crusaders youth movement, a dynamic young people's Sunday evening gatherings which he ran in the old Friends' Meeting House, scores of camps for children and young people which he helped with, work for Gideons International and the Scripture Gift Mission and involvement in the Stonebow Evangelical Church.

He said Mr Rollinson, a widower who was married to Melvine, had three children, Hugh, Ruth and Andrew, and lived for many years in Fulford but more recently in Heworth. He was a long-serving council employee in York and then East Riding of Yorkshire, and was on fire-watch duty on the Mansion House roof on April 28/29, 1942, when it was bombed. He then served in the Army in India and later became Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages in Fulford.








Jane Merryweather sold Spirella Corsets, going around the village on her bicycle.

Its most popular corset was the Model 305. Spirella products were not sold in shops. Instead, female staff called corsetiers were sent to customer's homes


