





An example of how commissions were bought and young men could become officers without military training

Arthur Wellesley - Duke of Wellington 1769 – 1852

Family: 3rd son, minor Anglo-Irish aristocracy

Age: 18

March 1787: gazetted to an ensign 73rd Highland reg. of Foot. Avoided joining regiment in India

because;

Nov. 1787: Became aide-de-camp to Lord lieutenant of Ireland (10s/day almost 2x ensign pay)

Dec. 1787: Promoted to lieutenant in new 76th Foot regiment raised for service in India.

Age: 19

1788: Exchanged to 41st Foot, conveniently based in Ireland, allows him to retain his additional

staff pay.

Age:20

1789: 41st foot to 12th light Dragoons- also stationed in Ireland.

Age: 21

1791: Captain 58th foot.

Two steps in promotion in 4 years.

Also sitting as MP for the family seat of Trim.

Age: 24


1793: Lieutenant colonel 33rd regiment of foot, commission bought by brother Richard.

About to enter action for the first time with no formal training.


York Cavalry Barracks late C19th.




No 1 Heslington Lane (recent photograph taken from the west side.)





North House (foreground, left). Early C20th





Anthony Lefroy son of Captain Anthony Lefroy. First Chief Constable of the Gloucestershire County Constabulary






The Tom Lefroy – Jane Austen affair.

"......the York Lefroys got up a very strong version of it all, and spread their own notions in the Family - but they were for years very angry with their Kinsman (Thomas Langlois Lefroy) and very delighted in a proof, as they thought, of his early heartlessness."

Caroline Austen writing to her brother, James who was writing the first biography of Jane Austin, their aunt.



Poor animal!, she will be worn out before she is thirty - I am very sorry for her - Mrs. Clement too is in that way again. I am quite tired of so many children - Mrs. Benn has a 13th."

Jane Austen writing in March 1817 to her niece, Fanny Knight, on another birth of her niece, Anna Lefroy. She was to have seven children altogether.

In researching this talk, some information was readily available because of the Austen connections; however, there were big gaps and questions still to be answered:

What was Captain Lefroy doing from 1802-1817?

How did he avoid direct involvement in the Napoleonic Wars as a commissioned Captain?

How did the family survive on the HP of an army officer?

As an established barrister, with a wife and family, why was TEPL still recorded as living with his parents in Fulford in 1851?
