Busk Coffee Shop, Sandringham Street

The owner of Busk kindly allowed Chris Rainger of FFH, to take notes from the original deeds for purchase of the land where the shop was built.

Here are some snippets:

Dated 3rd March 1869. Price £180

Between the vendor; Ambrose Walker and Thomas Tittensor, baker.

Plot of land defined as;

Bounded to the south by the Lighthorseman, to the north by the newly built Sandringham Street, and to the west, other land being part of the Fishergate House estate belonging to Ambrose Walker.

Ambrose Walker had bought the Fishergate House estate in June 1868 from Maria and Eliza Laycock, spinsters, then of Winkfield, (near Windsor) Berkshire.

A condition of the purchase was that Tittensor was not to erect more than 2 dwelling houses or shops without the written consent of Ambrose Walker.

Also, Tittensor was to pay for making ½ of Sandringham St. in front f his plot to a standard approved by surveyors of the Local Board of Health.

Fishergate Shops c.1910


Note that only the corner shop and the next three, have 'proper' shop fronts.


